
For the Chipeta Chapter Summer Picnic

From the Editor

I don't have a whole lot to say for this month's abbreviated issue. Like everyone else out there, I'm gearing up for summer. So here are just some tidbets I've come across in the archaeological news in the past month, starting with the one closest to home (Wyoming), and then moving away to South America and western and then eastern Europe. Enjoy your summer. The Uncompander Journal will be back in September.

1. University of Wyoming archaeologists lay claim to the oldest mine so far discovered in the Americas. The object of the mining activities was the mineral pigment: red ochre. Mining activities began around 12,800 years ago. The presence of stone tools made of materials from as far away as Texas suggests that Wyoming ochre may have been distributed widely around North America.

2. A report in *Nature* describes the results of lidar investigations in the Amazon basin in Bolivia. The team discovered a large urban settlement system with civic-ceremonial structures, where previous generations of archaeologists had found a general absence of evidence of social complexity beyond the ephemeral traces of widely-scattered hunter-gatherers or horticulturalists. Lidar is a wonderful thing!

3. A team in Denmark, undeterred by the absence of human remains and grave goods in a Viking-age chambered tomb, used high tech to analyze soil for telltale biochemical indicators of what had been buried but not preserved in its original state. This could be a real boon for places where the soil and/or atmospheric conditions are not conducive to preservation.

4. A team in Croatia analyzed regular changes in the size of domestic dogs in the transition from neolithic farming cultures into the Bronze and Iron Ages. As livestock became more important to society and dogs were increasingly being used to help protect the livestock, dogs gained considerably in size and weight.
